The following questions are asked in order to examine how successfully your child's use of hearing aids is. Questions are based on behavior and every-day hearing experience. Please read the questions carefully. If you are unable to answer a question or if a certain question is not appropriate for your child, please leave the question unanswered. Your evaluation can significantly help us to improve the performance of your child's hearing aids – your support can make a big difference

A. Perception of Language, Music and Noises:

1. Does your child imitate new noises, sounds and/or words since wearing the new hearing aids?

Own Voice / Pronunciation:
